Terminology

A FutureLearn degree is a degree-level qualification (e.g. Graduate Certificate or Masters) delivered through the FutureLearn platform.

Degrees are made up of FutureLearn programs; sequences of short FutureLearn courses, studied and assessed together as a single unit. These are equivalent to university modules, subjects or units.

A FutureLearn program run is an instance of FutureLearn program starting on a specific date.

A learner is a FutureLearn user who is not enrolled as a student at the university.

A student is FutureLearn user who is enrolled as a student at the university.

Study Groups

Study groups

Groups are available at course level

When used on a program, each groups belongs to one course

Learners can be assigned randomly or manually

Randomly allocated study groups

Groups are available on open and closed courses

Learners are allocated when they join a group

On open courses, group size is recommended to be large to take into account non-participants

Manually allocated study groups

Groups are available on closed courses, and only on courses where students are invited through Learning Manager or the partner API

Educators can create groups before learners have accepted invitation

Learners can be allocated based on any criteria

Group size is recommended at about 5 to 8 learners

In beta, requires FL development step to create

Limitations to manually assigned groups

Groups are fixed once the course begins

There can only be one group per course

But educators can reuse groups across courses within a program

Educator experience

 Both randomly and manually assigned groups are enabled on the course

Study groups

Study groups is a beta feature that will be available to use on course runs for all partners. With study groups enabled on your course, you can design opportunities for learners to learn together in smaller groups.

Before enabling this feature, please read these study group guidelines and look through the following list of what's needed to create effective study groups in courses.

- 1. Introduce study groups by setting learners a specific goal-oriented task to complete early in the course.
- 2. When setting the initial task, be clear about what learners have to do, how long it should take, and what they should achieve.
- 3. Explain to learners what they should expect in terms of course team facilitation within study groups.
- 4. Create regular prompts to broadcast to study groups throughout the course, asking learners to perform particular tasks within the group. Avoid tasks which simply ask learners to discuss a statement.
- 5. Give study groups tasks which are structured, achievable and written using imperative language.
- 6. Reference study group tasks in the course steps.


Study groups can be turned on or off up to 4 weeks before the course starts.



• On randomly assigned groups, learners need to join group


